SPRING HAS SPRUNG!

Description: Birds Nest and Butterflies Author: Mary Hager Grade level or Target Age Range: Pre-School Vocabulary: Spring, Insects, Birds, Nests


Bird's Nest

Materials

- 1. Paper plate
- 2. Washable brown paint
- 3. Glue
- 4. Paint brushes or foam brushes
- 5. Brown, blue, green, yellow, orange, and prink construction paper
- 6. Plastic Easter eggs
- 7. Picture of a birds nest or a real birds nest
- 8. Foam stickers such as insects, leaves, and flowers (all things that we might find in a real birds nest)

Directions

- 1. Talk about what we notice when the weather changes and it starts to get warm outside:
- The leaves turn green
- Flowers bloom
- Birds come out
- Insects too
- 2. Start the project by discussing how a bird makes their nests and what they use.
- Twigs
- Leaves
- Sometime even trash they find
- 3. Show students a real nest so they can see how a bird weaves the sticks together.
- 4. Start by painting paper plates brown—place and small amount of paint in the middle of each paper plate and ask students to spread it all the way to the edges.
- 5. Set aside to dry



- 6. Give each student one plastic egg and have them separate the egg. Each side of the egg will be one of the baby birds.
- 7. Glue a beak and wings to each plastic bird
- 8. Set aside to dry.
- 9. Now take the paper plate and do the same thing but with glue. Ask each student to spread the glue to the edges of the plate.
- 10. Now add strips of brown paper onto the plate the same way a bird weaves their nest.
- 11. Once the twigs have been added give each student the stickers for them to place on the plate wherever they choose to.
- 12. We did not glue the baby birds to the plates so that the students could play with them

Butterflies

Materials

- 1. Liquid watercolor
- 2. Tin bowls to put the watercolors in
- 3. Small plastic droppers
- 4. Coffee strainers
- 5. Pipe leaners

Directions

- 1. Give each student a coffee strainer
- 2. Demonstrate how to use the plastic droppers (squeeze very gently so that watercolor doesn't spray everywhere)
- 3. Once the butterflies have dried pinch the center and wrap a pipe cleaner around it.
- 4. Have the student curl the antennas
